Proceedings from the 16th Viking Congress held in Reykjavík and Reykholt in Iceland in August 2009.

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Since 1950 the Viking congresses have brought together leading scholars of archaeology, philology, history, toponymy, numismatics and a number of other disciplines to discuss the Viking Age from this interdisciplinary approach.

The proceedings from each congress have added important contributions to Viking studies.
